
### 1952 Runabout Hull #5002 Original Owner Luna Daffin Blairsville, Ga.


These are some pictures of it in it's current state, plus one picture of it when in it's prime being towed by my 1972 El Camino. (The plastic strip in the picture of the inside of the boat is the windshield.)

The boat has always been in our family. It was my brother's 14th birthday present, and based on his age we think it's a 1952 or 1953 14' model. The hull I.D. # is 5002. It came with a 30 Hp (short shank) Johnson motor and a Gator trailer. The motor had to be replaced and it now has a short shank 65 Hp Mercury motor. The trailer is the original.

Several years ago it needed to be resealed and refinished. The man doing the restoration died before he finished. At the time of his death he had 4-5 boats in various stages of refurbishment. His son had quite a task identifying owners and putting their boats back together to return to them. I finally got my boat back, as it is, this past summer. He still hasn't been able to locate some of the hardware. The boat needs a lot of work to get it back in top notch shape. The wood is very solid and in good shape except it needs sanding and refinishing. The seats do need to be rebuilt. After it is restored it will once again be a beautiful little wooden boat. It has a lot of sentimental value to me.

Velma's was a relatively elite ladies clothing store (that even mixed custom facial powders) where I worked wrapping Christmas gifts in the second half of the '60s. Miss Velma Sutherland was well known in Panama City and I frequently accompanied my mother there. The boat in the pictures looks to me like about a '57-'59 Carter Craft. The sign is for Gulf Marine, which was one of the local dealers, and was owned by the Mizells who lived just down the street from us (also assuming Mrs. Mizell shopped there too). I imagine my dad and Mr. Mizell convinced Miss Velma it would get a lot of notice for her store. My dad was a very creative promoter!. Keep in mind Panama City was pretty small back then.

Information I was provided says they were on left side of dash, but had to be visible from seat.






